Do not use for wet coughs, as it may worsen the condition by increasing lung secretions.
Description	Tall, hardy. Large, bright yellow 2" wide flowers in long branched spikes up to 8-10 feet tall, above a rosette of leaves. Whole plant is covered with dense, yellow down.

Description	Hardy perennial to 3 feet with feathery leaves and flat clusters of white flowers. Spreads by roots and seeds. Spreads easily
Other	Taking yarrow orally may cause sensitivity to sunlight in some individuals. High in tannins, which can be used to clean (as an alternative to soap).
